Welcome to *Faithful to All His Promises*, a study on the promises of God. In this study, you will learn that God is a faithful promise-keeping God, and you will discover some of His promises. For those who are trusting in Jesus as their Savior, the promises of God are precious and powerful because they are backed by the all-powerful, all-knowing, faithful, patient, gracious, unchanging, sovereign Ruler of the universe. God's promises are sure because God is watching to see that His Word is performed (Jeremiah 1:12). If you have not received Jesus as your Savior, God's promise is just as sure—"for the LORD knows the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked will perish" (Psalm 1:6). May this study of God and His promises lead you to trust in Him.

How to Use Your Notebook

Your notebook has been designed to help you learn and apply the truths taught during the lesson.

What to Do in Each Section

Notes from the Lesson

Write key ideas to help you remember important truths about God and His promises. Answer the questions, fill in the blanks, summarize the lesson, and complete the lists and charts. Writing promotes active listening and participating in the learning process, making it more enjoyable and profitable for you.

Activity

Each lesson has an activity for you to do alone, with a partner, or with your small group. The point of the activity is to relate concepts and truths to everyday life, to encourage deeper thinking about the concepts in the lesson, to challenge you to put the truth into action, and to encourage prayer.

Action Step

During your small group time in class, think about what you learned and decide on an action step. This should be something specific you can do during the week to act on the truth you have learned. It could be a verse to memorize, a prayer topic for the week, a person you must apologize to, someone to pray for, a habit to begin or to break, a commitment to make, etc.

Applying these actions daily will allow God to use these truths to shape your life. If you practice acting on the truth of God's Word, it will help you trust God and to know that all His promises will someday be fulfilled. **Note:** There are five pages of action step slips in the back. Record your action step on one of these slips to cut out and take home as a reminder throughout the week. Next week, you'll record the steps you took where indicated in this notebook.

Prayer

Pray about the truths in the lesson, praise God for who He is, and pray for one another.


This notebook should be kept in the classroom during the study, but after the study you can take it home to use as a review tool, a devotional or prayer focus, and an aid for teaching others the truths you are learning.

Completing your notebook thoroughly and thoughtfully will provide you with a wonderful resource. Like most things in life, the more effort you put into the activities, the more benefit you will receive from them. By approaching it with eagerness, an open heart, and a desire to learn from God, you may find that God has much to show you about Himself.

May you seek the Lord with all your heart and find Him to be your greatest treasure.


Characteristics of God:



Action Step: The Bible calls us to be people of action, to "be doers of the word, and not hearers only" (James 1:22). Taking to heart the truths you have heard each week and putting them into practice, or taking practical steps to apply them to everyday life can be a means of spiritual growth. Each week, review what you wrote in the previous week's summary, remember the lesson, and record in this box any steps of faith you took to let the truth change your life. It may be an act of kindness, a confession of sin, a change in your attitude, etc. Ask God during the week to use the truths taught to affect you deeply.

This week, look for promises in the Bible. How can you put one of them into practice?

Prayer: Think of the good things that God does for us and the ways in which He is good. Thank God specifically for His goodness.




Something to Think About: If you are a Christian, you became a member of God's family, not because you were born into it, but by adoption.


God's Promises to His Children (Psalm 34:15; Psalm 34:17; Psalm 91:14; Psalm 103:11; Isaiah 40:31)





Something to Think About: You can't expect God to fulfill a conditional promise if you haven't done your part.

Something to Think About: If salvation was something people had to pay for, not even a multibillionaire could afford it. Aren't you glad God offers salvation as a free gift? God's promises are a gift we don't deserve, but they are also a gift that He freely gives.

Directions: Other religions reject God's gift of salvation through the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross. Instead, they have developed their own way to earn salvation. Read about each religion and put a check mark by everything that requires man's effort to earn salvation.

Man's Path to Heaven²

Buddhism: The Noble Eightfold Path to "Nirvana"

1. Good deeds are compared to bad deeds. If a person has more good deeds than bad deeds, he will eventually get to paradise. But first, he must spend some time burning in hell.

C Islam: Two ways to get to "paradise"

2. Die as a martyr for the cause of Islam. This means going directly to paradise.

🕉 Hinduism: Three ways to get to "Moksha"

- ✓ 1. The Way of Action (Works or Activity)−performing religious ceremonies and duties. This requires helping others rather than serving yourself.
- 2. The Way of Knowledge—studying Hindu teaching and arriving at an understanding of the universe.
- ✓ 3. The Way of Devotion—performing acts of worship to any of the thousands of Hindu gods. This is a sign of devotion to and love for this god.
- 4. Some Hindus also believe in The Royal Roadproperly performing the physical exercise of yoga and meditation.

- 1. Right Understanding–accepting the Four Noble Truths about suffering.
- 2. Right Resolve-denying physical pleasures, not harming any living creature, thinking kindly about everyone.
- ✓ 3. Right Speech−not lying, gossiping, criticizing, or harshly speaking.
- 4. Right Action-not killing, stealing, or performing impure actions.
- ✓ 5. Right Occupation (Livelihood)—avoiding jobs that would cause you to be dishonest or to hurt other people or animals.
- ✓ 6. Right Effort-making diligent efforts to improve your good thoughts and good behavior; and to conquer evil in yourself.
- ✓ 7. Right Contemplation—focusing attention on your thoughts, feelings, words, and actions in order to be free from wrong desires and attitudes.
- ✓ 8. Right Meditation (Concentration)—disciplining your mind to concentrate on one object in order to attain a higher state of consciousness (the state of mind of a god).

In all of these religions, man is trying to reach "god." Salvation is achieved through inner strength and good works, through the self-efforts of man. Do you think anyone could earn salvation?

God's Path to Heaven

• Christianity: The Bible tells us that God Himself has provided the way of salvation as a free gift to anyone who calls on the name of the Lord. Jesus obtained this salvation by dying on the cross and taking the punishment for all who are trusting in Him. Salvation does not come through what we do but through what Christ did. Why is this Good News?



Something to Think About: There is *no one* who is so sinful that God will not forgive him if he confesses his sins and repents.



Promise: Nothing Can Separate You from God's Love

Memory Verses: For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, ³⁹nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.—Romans 8:38-39

Scripture: Luke 22:54-62; John 21:1-19; Romans 8:35, 37-39

Notes from the Lesson

- 1. Romans 8:38-39 is an unconditional promise, but it is meant only for <u>Christians; God's</u> children.
- 2. Why won't anything "be able to separate us from the love of God"? **because God is almighty** and faithful and never breaks His promise
- 3. True or X False? There are some sins that are too awful for even God to forgive.
- 4. How did Jesus treat Peter after Peter denied Him? with love and forgiveness; as a friend
- 5. Since we know that nothing can separate us from God's love and He will forgive our sins when we confess them, does that mean we can sin as much as we want? <u>no</u> Why or why not? <u>a sign of loving</u> <u>Jesus is grieving over sin; if we don't grieve over sin, we may not be a Christian</u>



Something to Think About: Christians can be separated from their possessions by theft, flood, fire, or breakage; and their loved ones by death, but they can never be separated from God.

Directions: Paul uses extreme opposites—death/life, height/depth—to show that absolutely NOTHING can separate a Christian from God's love. Promise: God Will Complete His Work in You


Memory Verse: ...he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ.—Philippians 1:6b

Notes from the Lesson

- Explain the meaning of Philippians 1:6b. God helps His children to be stronger in faith and grow more like Jesus.
- What was it that made such a big difference in the disciples on the day of Pentecost? <u>The Holy</u>
 <u>Spirit came and filled the disciples.</u>
- 3. Acts 4 shows us that the Holy Spirit changed Peter from being weak to being <u>strong</u>; from being fearful to being <u>bold</u>; and from being disloyal to being <u>loyal</u>. Satan wanted to have Peter but what had Jesus prayed for Peter? <u>that his faith would not fail</u>
- 4. God is working to complete His work in His children every day. When will that work be done? when they are with God in heaven

Something to Think About: It is a relief to know that God does not expect us to make ourselves like Jesus. That is His job. Our job is to cooperate with Him in the process.



Action Step: Review last week's BIG PICTURE summary. Record in this box any steps of faith you took to let the truth change your life.

Prayer: Thank God that He does not give up on His children but will complete His work in them. Pray about your need to have God work in your heart. Ask God to make you bold in telling others about Jesus. Write the name of one person to especially pray for this week:_____


Scripture: Matthew 5:16; John 15:5; Acts 9:36; Acts 10:38; Galatians 5:22-23

Notes from the Lesson

- 2. What is the condition for the Christian to bear fruit? **abiding in Jesus**
- 3. What does "abide in Jesus" mean? trust Jesus; to ask Him for help
- What kind of fruit is Jesus referring to? <u>the fruits of Jesus/the Spirit; love, joy, peace,</u> etc.
- 5. What other kind of fruit do Christians bear? good works
- 6. What are three marks of true good works? a.<u>done by God's people</u>,
 b.<u>with God's heart</u>, c.<u>for God's glory.</u>

Something to Think About: Any good works you do as a Christian may be an evidence that the Holy Spirit is at work in your life.






Something to Think About: One of the differences between the God of the Bible and false gods is that He can actually hear and answer prayer.

- 4. What were the two reasons George Mueller opened an orphanage? <u>to care for others; to show</u> others that God would supply the needs of those who trust Him


• Something to Think About: Our biggest needs are smaller than God's infinite supply!

LESSON 15 Promise: God Will Not Withhold Any Good Thing

Memory Verse: For the LORD God is a sun and shield; the LORD bestows favor and honor. No good thing does he withhold from those who walk uprightly.—Psalm 84:11

Scripture: 1 Samuel 1; Psalm 34:10; Psalm 84:11; Romans 8:32

Notes from the Lesson

- 1. What is the main idea of Psalm 84:11? <u>God does not withhold anything good from His</u> children.
- 2. Psalm 84:11 is a conditional promise. What is the condition? It is for the upright.
- 3. Why doesn't God withhold any good thing from those who love and honor Him? He is generous.
- 4. How did God show His generosity to Hannah? <u>He not only gave her Samuel, but also three</u> more sons; He gave her four sons and two daughters.
- 5. If God withholds something from us it is because it is not good for us.

Something to Think About: God doesn't withhold any good thing from His children. If you are a Christian and God withholds something from you, what He withholds is not the best thing for you.

Directions: Read each scenario, and then list three reasons why withholding this good thing might be good.

His parents knew that a bicycle injury would be very serious or even fatal. So they gave him something they thought was better. That boy was J.I. Packer, who became a theologian, pastor, and writer. He is considered one of the most influential evangelicals in North America. He is known for his book *Knowing God* and for his work as the editor of the English Standard Version Bible. What about the typewriter? It was not what Packer had asked for. Nevertheless, it proved to be what he needed.

Did J. I. Packer know what his accident and the typewriter would lead to? No, but this is what his biographer writes about Packer receiving the typewriter: "Surprise gave way to delight, as he realized what he could do with this unexpected gift. It was not more than a minute before he had put paper into the machine and started to type. It proved to be his best present and the most treasured possession of his boyhood."







Why does the Bible use the analogy of eagles? Eagles are not strong enough to fly to great heights. Instead, they look for warm air currents so they can ride the currents upward. Other birds hide in a storm, but eagles fly into the storm, seeking the currents to lift them up. They soar using the strength of the wind rather than merely their own energy. Soaring on the warm currents only takes 1/20th (5 percent) of the strength that flying takes. This is why eagles can soar up to 10,000 feet and speed along at 50-75 miles per hour. The secret is that they don't use their own strength.


No one is strong enough to face the challenges of everyday life on their own. The "storms" or difficulties of life are even harder to face. While friends and family can be a great support, only God is strong enough to carry you through your struggles. What struggles do you have? Maybe it is a problem you are facing right now, an attitude (like anger, rebellion, ingratitude, fear, laziness, etc.), or a habit (too much screen time, neglecting your Bible time, speaking disrespectfully, etc.) or something else. If you are a child of God, you do not have to struggle alone. You can "wait for the LORD" who will carry you on the wind of His strength.

Death seemed near as the ship was tossed about in the storm for four weeks. Newton had been reading a book called *Imitation of Christ* and, remembering a sobering verse from Proverbs, he repented and was saved. He later became a pastor and wrote the several hymns including **Amazing**

A verse from another hymn, "I Asked The Lord," showed he had learned, like Paul, that God brings necessary suffering for our good.

Tap Code and God's Faithfulness

Captain Carlyle ("Smitty") Harris was a pilot during the Vietnam war. On April 4, 1965, he participated in the bombing of the Thanh Hoa Bridge, which connected the Ho Chi Minh Trail, one of the most important military supply routes used by the North Vietnamese. The mission was successful, but Smitty's plane was hit and caught fire. He was presumed dead as his squadron saw his burning plane, but he failed to see any parachute. However, by God's grace, Smitty was able to parachute out of the plane.

He was captured by the North Vietnamese and became America's sixth prisoner of war (POW) of the Vietnam War. He was a POW for eight years, enduring interrogation, torture, and isolation. How did God sustain Captain Harris? Seemingly "by chance" while he was in training in the U.S., an instructor mentioned that POWs communicated during World War II by tapping on water pipes. The instructor "happened" to be walking beside Smitty as they left the classroom, and Smitty asked



how the prisoners tapped the dashes in Morse Code. It was then that the instructor explained that they not using Morse Code but Tap Code, and he drew the code for Smitty. Letters are tapped out according to their placement in a table; using first the number of the horizontal row, then the number of vertical column (e.g., B=1/2; H=2/3; C is used for K; and X means a new sentence.) Smitty taught this code to fellow prisoners, and they used it to communicate using any means they had to make a sound-tapping, coughing, sweeping, even once while chopping weeds, Smitty "chopped" in tap code. The prisoners would communicate news, poems, Bible verses, jokes, anything to keep their minds occupied and their spirits strong. When a prisoner was taken out to be tortured and questioned, often upon returning to his cell, he would hear the letters GBU tapped out to encourage him–God Bless yoU.

God takes care of His children in so many ways-even through seemingly coincidental learning of a code. During his 2,871 days as a POW, Smitty was kept from ultimate harm. He later said, "I prayed frequently and fervently because I had nowhere else to turn. I knew I needed help. And help came. The torture didn't stop. I wasn't free and back home. But I gained more than I even knew to pray for...The most important benefit for me was a renewed and strengthened faith in God. I knew that I would never be alone under any circumstances in my life." ⁵

LESSON 26 Promise: God Will Deliver You from All Your Troubles

Something to Think About: God allowed the three Hebrew men to be thrown into the furnace, but He was with them and delivered them from their troubles. We won't always be kept from trouble either, but we are not alone in them, and God will deliver us in some way.

Directions: ① Read the rest of the story about Captain "Smitty" Harris and the story of Annie Johnson Flint. ② Write down some ways you can be a blessing to others.

Delivered Through Rescue: On February 12, 1973, Captain Carlyle Harris walked out of prison. The Vietnam war was over! He was going home! At one point during his captivity, the 160-pound man had weighed less than 90 pounds. He endured many hardships, but God delivered him out of his troubles, and Smitty returned to his family on February 15,1973. He met his eight-year-old son for the first time. His preschool daughters were now 11 and 13, and his wife had never given up hope of his return.

Deliverance Through Sustaining Grace: Annie Johnson Flint was born on Christmas Eve 1866. When she was three, her mother died giving birth to Annie's sister. Both girls were sent to live with the widow of a friend of their father who had two children of her own and little income. The girls stayed there two years—"unwelcome and unwanted." But God was watching over these two little girls. Their own father had an incurable disease and could not care for them, but he permitted them to be adopted by the Flints, a Christian couple. In that home, they received care and love and, when she was eight years old, Annie trusted Christ as her Savior. After high school, Annie trained to become a teacher. In her second year of teaching, she began to suffer from rheumatoid arthritis, which only worsened until it became difficult for her to walk. She was barely able to finish her third year of teaching and continued to worsen the following three years. Then both of her adoptive parents died within a few months of each other. Her sister was "frail and struggling," and then Annie received the news that she herself would be a helpless invalid the rest of her life.

How did God deliver Annie Flint? He gave her sustaining grace. She was cheerful, positive, and had a love of writing poetry. Though her fingers were bent and disfigured and her joints swollen, her heart was full of love for and faith in her Savior. She wrote verses to encourage others and earn some income, publishing them on cards, magazines, and books. Eventually, her joints became so stiff she could hardly write. Though she was in constant pain for more than 40 years, she wrote more than a hundred poems, including these poems that became hymns of great encouragement, "He Giveth More Grace" and "God Hath Not Promised."

Deliverance Through Death: Annie realized that God had given her physical disabilities so that she might accomplish His great purposes in her life. Her suffering produced poems and hymns that have blessed thousands of people... and her Savior was her constant comfort and gained for her eternal joy.

How can you be a blessing? You may not be able to write poetry, but there are many ways you can encourage someone who is suffering in some way. Write below some ways you can be a blessing. Then take action to bless someone this week.
